Non-members who wish to see better quality photos without watermarks should contact the artists concerned. Serious enquiries will be responded to positively and promptly.





After spending a little time in Germany, mural painting, it was no surprise to anyone when I signed up to study visual arts at Northampton



University. My studies were very much based on political history and later, the influence of knowledge and so there was not an exhaust pipe in sight. We were encouraged to explore the cutting edge of fine art and for what it was, I enjoyed it hugely.

I signed up with an employment agency whilst studying, which took me to many venues such as Wembley Stadium, Newmarket Racecourse and Rockingham Speedway working behind bars and waiting tables. It also took me to Silverstone at the British Grand Prix where, in the first minute of my first shift I met Sir Stirling Moss..... I liked Silverstone!

After finishing my studies, Chelsea Football Club asked me to go and work for them and so I got myself a small flat in Shepherds Bush and walked to Stamford Bridge everyday to work. It was great fun and a wonderful experience even for a non-football fan like myself, but London only held it's charm for a short time and I was soon itching to move to parts more green. Rockingham Speedway stepped up and offered me the job of Operations Manager, which I took and spent five happy years there.

After Rockingham I decided to spend a year renovating an old farmhouse in Milton Keynes with my father. At the end of the year I received a ridiculously

well-timed phone call from Silverstone asking whether I would consider working for them. I signed up for six weeks only, just to see them through the Grand Prix and then I planned to return to Lancashire to spend some time with my family, whom I had seen little of for the last ten years. I took a job at Manchester United and settled in up North. I was not happy at Old Trafford and so moved to Haydock Racecourse which I liked even less, so I decided to call the one venue that I loved working at... Silverstone!

They gave me a job and a wonderful house within the circuit to live. Whilst at Silverstone we tendered for the newly built Yas Marina Circuit in Abu Dhabi, which we won and I was appointed Project Manager. I was now splitting my time between Silverstone and Yas Marina whilst tendering for

other projects and managing one-off events such as the National Game Fair.

And so to my paintings..... finally. Whilst living at Silverstone the house they had given me was large enough to set up a studio, which I did. I set up an easel and dug out the old paint brushes. I bought a canvas or two and painted whatever came to mind, which was a picture of Vettel lifting his victory finger as he does. I flashed the finished painting around a little and before I knew what was happening I had been roped into painting twelve pictures to hang in the BRDC Clubhouse at the British Grand Prix.

#### What?!

I furiously began painting F1 drivers in various victory poses trying to meet the deadline but had to call on my sister for help. She painted four glorious pictures to

fulfil the quota and we met the deadline the evening before qualifying started.



Regular readers will no doubt have noticed that I have become hooked on truck racing since moving to Brazil and have taken to attending a Copa Truck meeting every year at a different track which gives me an excuse to visit somewhere new. This year Copa Truck added 2 races outside Brazil, one in Uruguay and another in Argentina at the famous Autodromo Juan y Oscar Galvez where the Argentine Grand Prix and Buenos Aires 1000kms races used to take place. How could I resist?

This was my first visit to Buenos Aires and well worth going. It is a beautiful city with a lot of attractive architecture both old and new as well as some interesting museums and places of interest. My 5 days certainly wasn't enough although I managed to pack a lot in.

As in many tourist cities there is a hop-on, hop-off bus tour with multi-lingual commentary which is well worth taking to get an overview of the city and of course visit some of the attractions on the route. It was from this bus that I saw the bronze statue of Juan Manuel Fangio with life-size Mercedes-Benz W196 that you can see in the 'postcard' at the top of this page.

The other big attraction from the automotive point of view is the HQ of the ACA which incorporates a small

but excellent museum which I have reviewed elsewhere in this edition of **Redline**.

The bank of the River Plate, which presumably was once warehouses, has been regenerated with many bars and restaurants plus 2 interesting floating museums, both 19th century steam ships from the period when steam power was not totally trusted so they were equipped with sails too. For me, the smaller ship, ARA Uruguay, was the most interesting and it was used for Antarctic exploration. The other, ARA Presidente Sarmiento, was a naval training ship which has sailed all round the world over the years and was operational up until the 1960s. Both are well worth a visit and open on Mondays when most museums are closed.

Buenos Aires is very green with many parks plus a botanical garden and an amazing Japanese Garden which you have to pay to enter but it is well worth it. All in all, Buenos Aires is an excellent city to visit if you like museums, architecture and parks. Also there are many excellent restaurants, great steaks and some wonderful ice-cream parlours, plus of course the famous Tango shows. No beach though, and it is not as warm as Tio being further south, but definitely recommended.

## Museum Review

#### Automóvel Club Argentina, Buenos Aires

The ACA is the Argentine equivalent to the AA in the UK or AAA in the USA, operating a breakdown service for members as well as other functions including car insurance and issuing and renewal of driving licences. Their headquarters is housed in a grand building on Avenida del Libertador in the Palermo district of Buenos Aires, a long wide street that is home to a number of impressive buildings, parks, sculptures and memorials. It is a nice area to Just walk around and easily accessible by Subte (Buenos Aires Underground/Metro/Subway) train. The nearest station is Facultad de Derecho which is the northern end of Line H, the yellow one on the map.

The ACA building is primarily an office building but it includes a small but high quality collection of old cars, the majority over a century old. There are half a dozen in the reception area along with a couple of Gilera motor cycles as used by ACA patrols, very reminiscent of the old days of the AA, same colour too!

The actual museum is on the first floor. Entry is free and, being a working building, it is open Monday to Friday and closed weekends.





I believe there are more cars in the collection which are periodically swapped with some of those currently on display. Those I saw were as follows:

- 1910 Renault town car
- 1904 Cadillac Model B
- 1908 Fiat phaeton
- 1904 Schacht Model K voiturette (USA)
- Replica 1906 Renault Grand Prix car

- 1911 Wanderer
- 1949 Ferrari 166 as raced in Argentinian colours by Jose Froilan Gonzales
- 1969 BWA Bigua Fiat raced in Argentine Formula 2 by Carlos Reutemann
- 1970 Brabham BT30 raced in European Formula 2 by Carlos Reutemann
- 1971 Brabham BT36 raced in European Formula 2 by Carlos Reutemann
- 1901 De Dion Bouton
- 1892 Daimler (Cannstatt) landau
- 1897 Benz voiturette

Also on display are some motorcycles and scooters of Argentine manufacture, a couple of unidentified small single seater cars that look like mileage marathon contenders and an interesting collection of model cars, plus a few trophies and assorted memorabilia as well as some paintings.

At the back of the museum there is a door leading to a car park on the same floor. This may sound dull, but it was worth a look because outside the museum there was a small antique petrol on wheels, possibly for refueling a racing car? and 3 more historic vehicles, a 1936 Mercury tudor, an International truck from the 1920s and a 1950s tow truck which looks like a Willys design but my guess is it was made in Argentina by Kaiser.

Not a large collection but mostly very rare and interesting vehicles and all in excellent condition and it's fair to say that more than half were new to me.




#### The Iron Bridge, Newport Pagnell 1





This was my first opportunity to feature a fire station scene, in this case East Hull station (which has recently closed). It is set in the mid 60's.



Plukon are a major European supplier of chicken food products. For those unfamiliar with the area the two large chimneys on the left are from the thermal power station and known as the Poolbeg stacks. They stand over 200 feet tall and dominate the skyline for miles around, indeed one of the first things you see when arriving into Dublin by sea.



#### **Desert Cat**

This painting features a Caterpillar D8H-68a dozer on a McAlpines contract in the Sudan back in the early 70's, constructing irrigation canals and a sugar factory.



- 6 As the Courtauld Gallery is at present being refurbished, it is exhibiting 'The Coutauld Impressionists From Mant to Cezanne' at the National Gallery.
- 7 Polish driver Robert Kubica will return to Fl after a rallying crash in 2011 in which he suffered a very severe arm injury.
- 8 A stolen Picasso 'Tete d'Arlequin' (Harlequin's Head) was thought to have been found. The copy was however a radical Belgian theatre company's idea of performance art.
- 9 Street artist Banksy whose work (some £12-15 millions worth), had been exhibited without permission or insurance in a disused Belgian supermarket. Lawyers arrived, the paintings were removed and the matter will be settled in court.
- 10 A Pirelli high performance road tyre.
